

# What Time Should We Worship This Summer? Learnings from the Survey

Thanks to all who responded to the Board of Worship request for feedback on the question of changing our summer worship times. Your answers and comments were very helpful to the members of the Board, who ultimately decided against proposing any change in our worship times, for the following reasons:

- It is clear, both from well-documented research and your own responses, that holding one combined Sunday worship would result fewer people attending.
- While many responses reflected a willingness to attend no matter what time worship was held, a strong minority from both services indicated that they would be unwilling or unable to attend one service if it would be much later than the early service or much earlier than the later service. A variety of understandable reasons were given for this.
- Changing to one service made it more difficult for those who want to attend Sunday School to so do. It seemed wrong to impact this ministry without a strong reason.
- On the question of what positive reason resonated best with those who favored a change to one service for summer, the majority checked "meeting people from the other service," a goal which the Worship Board felt might better be met by another strategy (more on this below).
- The Board felt that any monetary savings to be gained by simplifying the worship schedule (thereby lowering the honoraria) for Pastor Verkouw's and Murray's substitutes would likely be outweighed by lower attendance and offerings.

Because many of you indicated a strong desire for occasions of fellowship between the steady groups that meet at our three worship times, the Board of Worship has proposed to the Congregation Council that we consider scheduling three Sundays throughout the year on which we would have one service together to mark a special occasion. Some suggested Sundays were:

- Pentecost, to support our confirmands and celebrate this major Festival together.
- Rally Day, to mark the end of summer and the beginning of a new education year.
- Sunday just before or after Christmas, depending how the calendar falls.
- Sundays on which we have congregational meetings, to encourage more attendance.
- Other ideas, not yet considered.

The council will be considering this proposal over these early weeks of summer.

Again, thanks to all whose responses helped us enter into this decision in a way that was responsible to the thoughts and opinions of our members.

# Backyard Vegetable Garden (EARTHEASY.COM)

## **Garden Layout:**

orientation and shade- The plants in your garden will want to face south, and will require a minimum of 5 hours of direct sunlight per day. Observe the path of shadows during the day from any trees, fences, tall objects or adjacent buildings in your yard. Sunlight calculators are available which give you a more precise measurement of sun exposure for choosing ideal planting locations. The area of maximum continuous light will likely be the best location for your garden.

proximity to trees, root systems - besides the shading effects of trees, consider the spread of their roots. Locate your garden plot at least 10' beyond the drip

line of any nearby trees. If you must grow close to any trees, you may need to dig a barrier around your garden to block root incursions. This can be done by digging a narrow trench to hard clay, or at least deeper than existing roots. Set a sheet of galvanized metal roofing, or any inert heavy material which roots cannot penetrate, on edge. Then fill in the trench with the barrier material even with the soil level or slightly above.
