The discussion focused nature of this group helps ensure women come back for consistent prenatal care and helps reduce the stigma associated with breast feeding. Overall, the program leads to healthier babies!

The baby gifts help incentivize women to return. Many of these women don't have baby showers or the financial resources to purchase necessary items. Our gifts are an important resource for them!
